He attended Sherwood Elementary, Nagel Middle, and Turpin High Schools. During his childhood he really enjoyed playing sports, with his favorite being baseball. He played football for Nagel and Turpin and proudly wore #53. His charismatic personality was undeniable, and he was voted Homecoming King his senior year.

After graduating from Turpin in 2004, he was a member of Sigma Chi and he graduated from OSU with a BA in Journalism in 2008. While in college he met his true love Emily Bruckmann whom he planned to marry. He also received an MA in Education from NKU. He had a passion for teaching and working with high school students. 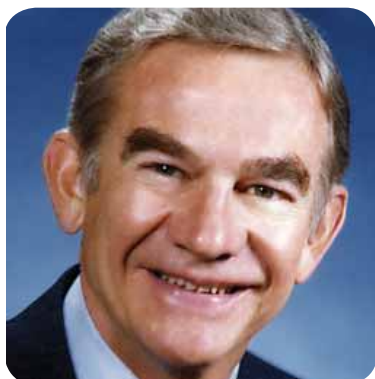

Julie graduated from The Summit Country Day School and then went on to St. Mary's College in Notre Dame, Indiana. After graduation, she returned to Cincinnati where she began observing the legal process as a docket clerk in the Hamilton County Clerk of Court's office. She took night classes and earned her law degree from the Salmon P. Chase College of Law in 1995. Julie served as an Assistant Prosecutor in the Juvenile Division, then as Director of the Board of Elections, until she was appointed to the bench of the Hamilton County Municipal Court in 2004.

Julie's greatest professional accomplishment was, perhaps, presiding over the Mental Health Court. A problem solver by nature, Julie enjoyed the unique challenges and rewards that Mental Health Court provided. She reveled in cheering on the successes of individuals who engaged in criminal behavior due to mental illness and, with the support and treatment she helped provide, became productive members of society. For her work, she was honored with the Greater Cincinnati Behavioral Health Services Champion of Hope Award, and the Hamilton County Mental Health and Recovery Service Board's Mary Rose Geckle Leadership Award.

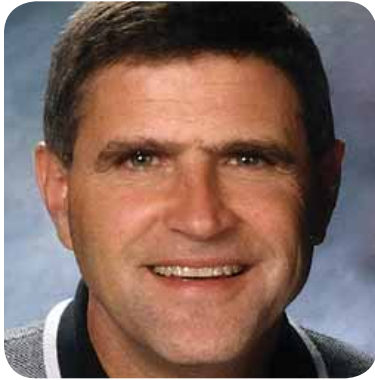

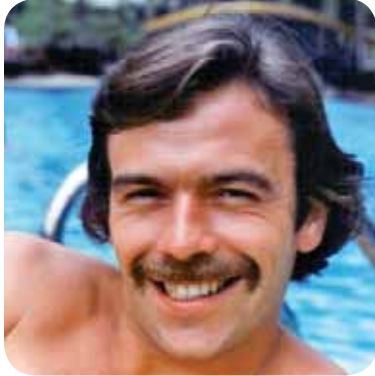
2011 New Honoree: Bob Wirth

One of the top 15 trampolinists in the United States, Jordan Bonne was training hard to achieve his dream of competing in the 2012 Olympics. At the 2002 U.S. National Championships, the gifted trampolinist finished second in his age group in addition to a silver medal finish in the synchronized trampoline event. The following year, Jordan placed 16th in the World Age Group Games in Hanover, Germany.

At 15 years of age, Jordan was no doubt a gifted athlete, but those who knew him said what made Jordan special was the impressions he made on everyone he met by living an example of faith, family, and friendship. Many parents have commented that, as a result of Jordan's death, they have reassessed their priorities and are now putting family first instead of jobs. Teens have told Jordan's family that they want to strive to become more like Jordan – to live their lives with passion, faith and love for family. The positive manner in which he touched many lives is evident by the many entries on a website created in his memory.

Jordan passed away on January 19th due to a head injury sustained during a trampoline event at the Flip Fest Invitational in Knoxville, Tennessee. Jordan was a sophomore at Turpin High School and would have been a graduate of the Class of 2006. Upon graduation, even though Jordan was no longer a student, his classmates still voted him "Most Unforgettable".

Continuing Honoree: David and Millie Pavlik

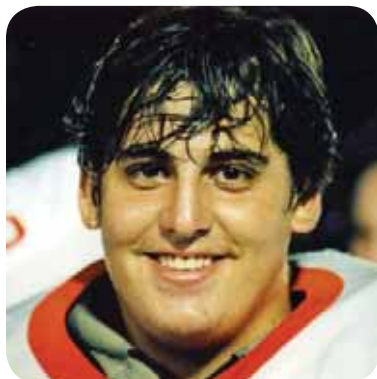
